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1. Introduction

From the CEO



Mr Kim Sampson, CEO

The Immunisation Coalition is a company limited by guarantee, first incorporated in 2006 as the Influenza Specialist Group; 2 years later I became the very first employee. Now, almost 14 years later, we have matured into a very different organisation while firmly adhering to the principles it was built upon. Over that time we have grown from 1 staff member (0.6 EFT), to 8 full and part-time staff (4.2 EFT).

This is the first annual report we have created for public consumption. Our statutory obligations under the Corporations Act require that we generate a Directors report (and audited financial statements) for each of our financial years, which is peculiarly from November to October. We have instead opted for the calendar year, shining a light on 2021. It was tempting to report on a decade and more of activities leading up to now, but I think the founder and inaugural Chairman, Dr Alan Hampson OAM, provides a clear and succinct history in chapter 5 of the report.

The enormous output that we generate is only possible because of the staff we employ, to whom I am forever grateful. They are a wonderful team of skilled and dedicated individuals. I am also extremely fortunate to be working with such a marvelous Board of Directors. Chaired by Dr Rod Pearce AM, they are all highly regarded individuals, who give their time freely and willingly.

The last (but certainly not the least) group to acknowledge is the Scientific Advisory Committee chaired by Prof Robert Booy. They, along with members of the Board, are the people I go to when the media calls, or when I need a speaker to present at a particular meeting we are putting together or collaborating on. They are the people who have given us the reputation that we have earned over the many years of our existence.

It is with great pleasure and pride that I present this 2021 Annual Report.

2. Board of Directors



Dr Rod Pearce AM
MBBS, FAMA, Immunisation Coalition Chairman

Rod Pearce is a practicing grass roots General Practitioner (GP) and policy adviser. He was President of *The Australian Medical Association (SA)* from 1998 to 2000, GP Nationally Elected Representative on the Federal AMA and Chair of the *AMA Council of General Practice* for 3 terms from 2004 to 2010.

In 2008 he was appointed by the then Health Minister, The Hon. Nicola Roxon, to the External Reference Group to develop *Australia's National Primary Health Care Strategy for the national health reforms*.

He is a member of the *Asia Pacific Alliance for the Control of Influenza (APACI)* and former *Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation (ATAGI)* member.

On Australia Day 2012 Dr Pearce was admitted to the Order of Australia (AM) for service to medicine as a general practitioner, through contributions to national medical organisations, and to education.



Prof Robert Booy
MBBS (Hons), MSc, MD, FRACP, FRCPC

Prof Robert Booy has been a Board member since 20 April 2012. He is Senior Professorial Fellow at the Children's Hospital Westmead School of Child and Adolescent Health.

He is a medical graduate of the University of Queensland (1984) and also trained in Paediatrics at the Royal Children's Hospital, Brisbane.

Previously Professor/Head of Department of Child Health with the University of London (1999-2005), he was the recipient of a Wellcome training fellowship in epidemiology focusing on genetic factors important in meningococcal disease, and is also the recent recipient of an NHMRC Practitioner Fellowship.

Professor Booy's research interests extend from understanding risk factors for susceptibility to, and severity of, infectious diseases, especially influenza, and invasive disease caused by encapsulated organisms; the clinical, public-health, social and economic burden of these diseases (acutely and over the long-term) and means by which to prevent or control serious infections through vaccines, drugs and non-pharmaceutical measures.

He is recognised as an expert in the COVID and influenza fields, supervising many studies addressing the burden and prevention of respiratory viral disease in children and adults, in the UK, Australia and among Muslim pilgrims to Saudi Arabia.

He has fellowships in Infectious Diseases from the Royal Australasian College of Physicians, in Clinical Microbiology from the Royal College of Pathologists of Australasia and from the Australasian College of Tropical Medicine.

He is the Principal Investigator and Medical Director at Nucleus Network Brisbane; a specialised contract research organisation specialising in early and late phase trials predominantly in Infectious Diseases where he has been the Principal Investigator on over 125 clinical trials, predominantly vaccines.

Finally, as a Clinical Microbiologist, he maintains an active interest in diagnostic microbiology.



Prof Gary Grohmann
B.Sc. (Hons), PhD, FASM

Gary Grohmann was employed by the TGA in Canberra as the Director of Immunobiology (Vaccines), and Director of the WHO ERL, Office of Laboratories and Scientific services from 1997-2015. He is currently working as an independent consultant virologist, primarily working with the WHO in Geneva on a number of influenza related projects with the Immunisation, Vaccines and Biologicals group.

Previously, he has been on a number of WHO steering committees, including the committee for the review of the IVTM database on influenza viruses and reassortant influenza viruses, and the WHO

VCM committee that recommends virus strains for influenza vaccines (until 2015), and a member of the Technical Advisory Group (2007 – 2015) of the Global Action Plan (GAP) for Influenza – a strategy to reduce the present global shortage of influenza vaccines for seasonal epidemics and pandemic influenza in all countries of the world, especially developing countries. He also worked with the PIP Review Secretariat and as consultant on switching from seasonal to pandemic vaccine production (2015-17). In addition, he worked on the review of Biocontainment documents (2018).

His primary interests are in vaccines, vaccine regulation, medical and veterinary virology, and infectious diseases resulting from contaminated food and water as well as other environmental sources. He is currently a Director of Environmental Pathogens P/L and also an Adjunct Associate Professor in the Department of Infectious Diseases and Immunology, University of Sydney.

5. Our History

The Influenza Specialist Group (ISG)

The foundation of the Influenza Specialist Group (ISG) was prompted by alarmist media reports in 1990 which suggested that, based on outbreaks in North America, Australia was facing a severe influenza epidemic. As a consequence, there was a demand for influenza vaccination unparalleled since the 1969 Hong Kong pandemic, and vaccine supplies were quickly exhausted. This was followed by considerable adverse publicity particularly based on older adults and those in defined risk groups being unable to obtain 'life-saving' vaccine and that younger healthy adults had consumed the available supplies. Responsibility was variously attributed to all those in the supply chain - vaccine manufacturers, pharmacies through whom the vaccine was dispensed at that time and doctors who wrote the prescriptions. Governments and public health officials also came in for criticism.

In response, a consortium representing all of those stakeholders was convened to review the reasons for the shortage and to plan a way forward. The group included Alan Hampson, who had a long history of influenza vaccine development at CSL, one of the vaccine suppliers, and who had been allocated the task of interfacing with the media on behalf of CSL during the shortage.

The principal issues identified were the low annual influenza vaccine uptake in Australia over the previous two decades with annual production based on current demand, the long lead-time involved in vaccine production and inability to increase supply in response to sudden demand, a poor understanding of the impact of influenza and the benefits of vaccination among not only the Australian general public but also primary health carers and, it appeared, even those writing national vaccination guidelines. Consequently, there had been a failure to actively promote influenza vaccination in Australia even to older adults and others at high risk of severe infections.


The consortium agreed that a step to avoiding future shortages would be to increase vaccine supply by encouraging uptake in the 'at risk' groups from an existing low coverage rate and thereby provide an improved buffer against unexpected demand. An 'influenza awareness week' was planned, to be conducted in early 1992. Dr Brendan Nelson, then Vice-President of the Australian Medical Association (AMA), was designated to chair the event and a program of media briefings and lectures were arranged in Sydney, Melbourne and Adelaide under the auspices of the AMA. In the absence of strong influenza vaccination advocates in Australia, the consortium invited Professor Steven Mostow from the University of Colorado, who was often referred to as Dr Flu, to participate. In the following year the program was extended to include Brisbane, and Auckland and Wellington in New Zealand with the overseas influenza vaccination advocate Professor David Fedson from the University of Virginia, USA.



Alan Hampson OAM

Alan Hampson who had now moved to lead, as its Deputy Director, the newly designated WHO Collaborating Centre for Influenza in Melbourne, one of three such centres globally, increasingly assumed a leadership role in planning and executing annual influenza awareness programs conducted by the consortium. This became known as the Influenza Specialist Group with Alan as Chairman. Each year a meeting, comprising a developing group of local key opinion leaders together with stakeholders, was conducted to discuss advances in knowledge of influenza, its recent epidemiology and vaccination issues, and to develop key messages for the annual campaign. The use of international experts continued through to 1996 with a video-conferencing call to that year's invitee during the annual meeting to ensure consistency of messaging. Emerging local key opinion leaders (KOLs) received media training during these meetings.

The annual awareness programs were supported financially by sponsoring companies involved in the supply of vaccines, and then antivirals, in Australia together with in-kind support provided via a PR company which delivered administrative and secretarial services for the annual meetings and awareness programs. From 1997 onwards the program was conducted solely using a now well-developed KOL network across the country. In 2006 the ISG was formally registered as a not-for-



profit organisation with a Board of Directors. In 2008, an executive officer (Kim Sampson) was appointed and a physical registered office established.

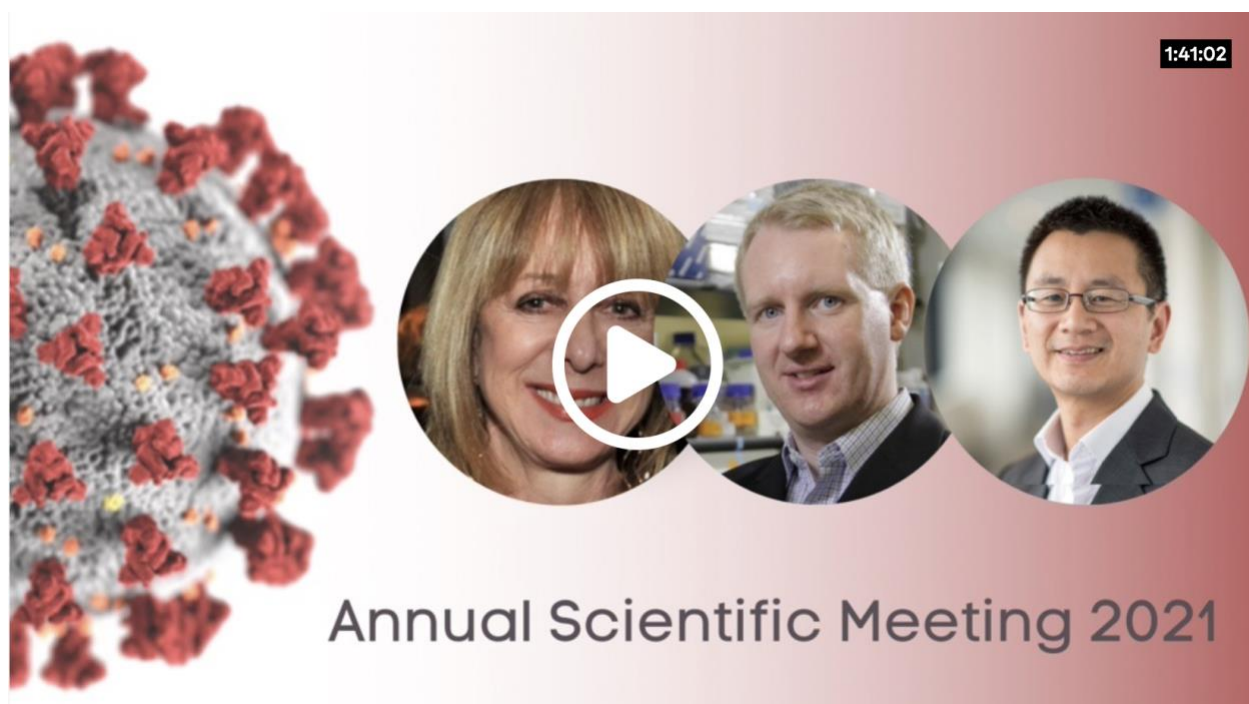
Progressively the ISG appointed staff to bring all of its administrative and media PR functions in-house. The organisation has had a major impact on vaccine uptake and vaccination attitudes and has continued to operate with financial and in-kind support from a number of commercial sponsors from whom it operates at arms-length. In 2016, in order to bring its acquired expertise and success in influenza vaccination advocacy to bear on a wider range of vaccine preventable diseases, particularly those affecting adults, the organisation was rebranded as the Immunisation Coalition (IC).

Immunisation Coalition (IC)

After 25 years at the helm, having overseen the transition from ISG to IC, Alan Hampson retired as chairman (and from the Board in 2018). In 2016, Prof Paul Van Bynder succeeded Alan as Chairman of the IC, broadening the organisation's remit and expanding HCP education. Paul remained in the role for 2 years and was followed by Prof Robert Booy. In 2020, Dr Rod Pearce AM became the 4th Chairman, and remains in the role today.

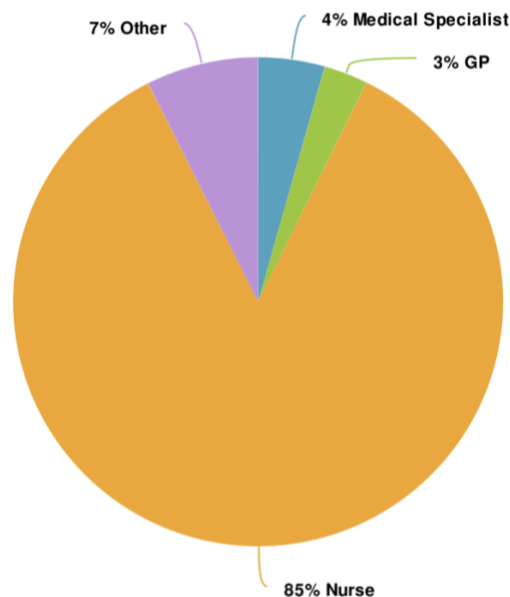

8.Round Table

Messaging around Influenza Vaccination

In 2018 the IC held a series of round table discussions involving industry, GPs and pharmacists, with the purpose of improving messaging around influenza vaccination. There was very good intent, and positive steps forward, but we were unable to bring the Government to the table, and in the end the scourge of competing interests prevailed.

Fast forward to 2021 and we have held a new series of round table meetings, this time broadening the group, and successfully engaging with the Commonwealth Department of Health. The outcomes to date have been very positive, with a genuine enthusiasm for consistent messaging around influenza vaccination. The discussions are continuing through 2022.

In December of 2021, during a meeting organised by the Pharmacy Guild of Australia, the Immunisation Coalition's CEO had the opportunity to speak with Health Minister, The Hon Greg Hunt MP, who expressed his appreciation of the work undertaken by the IC, and offered to express his thanks in writing. 9. Influenza Action Week

Summary of Event

The 2021 *Influenza Action Week* (IAW) is a national awareness week focused on highlighting the importance of influenza vaccination, especially in a pandemic world. In 2022, the name will be changed to “Immunisation Action Week”, to recognise the permanence of Covid-19, and to enable promotion of immunisation against all vaccine preventable diseases.

The FluSquad



Second year Monash University students, Yannee and Katya, are volunteering their services to the Immunisation Coalition as part of the FluSquad which was formed in 2021 with Katya, Yannee, and the IC. Having met the Coalition’s CEO during a virtual Hackathon in Singapore in 2020, the seeds for an influenza awareness week were germinated. Now the FluSquad is an integral part of the IC’s mission to deliver next year’s Immunisation Action Week. while fulfilling their obligations as dedicated students of pharmacy and medicine.

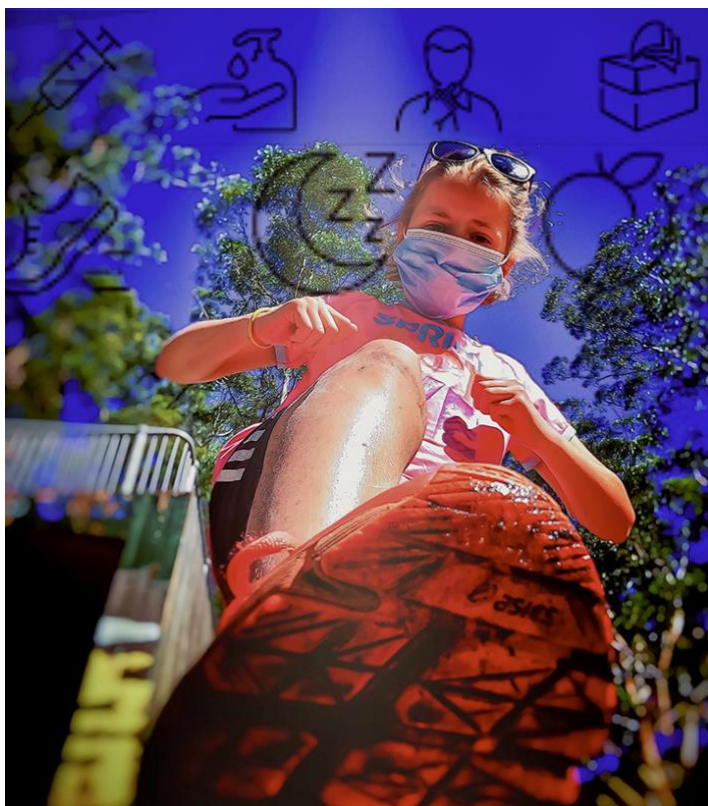
2021 Immunisation Coalition Art Prize

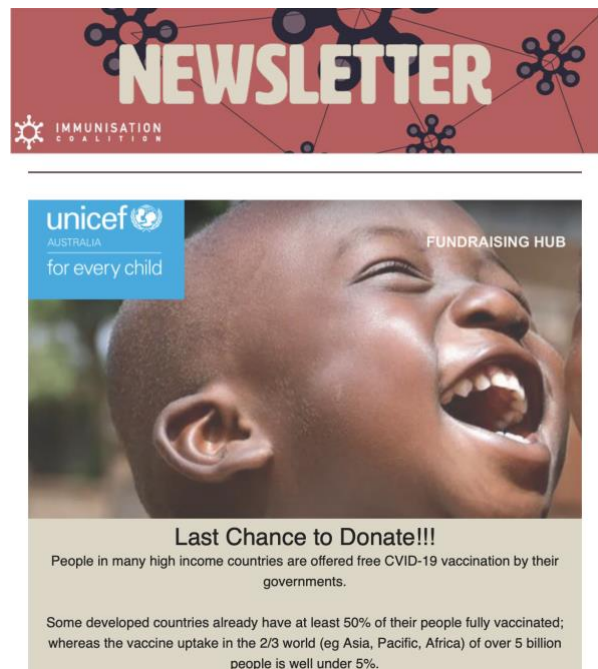

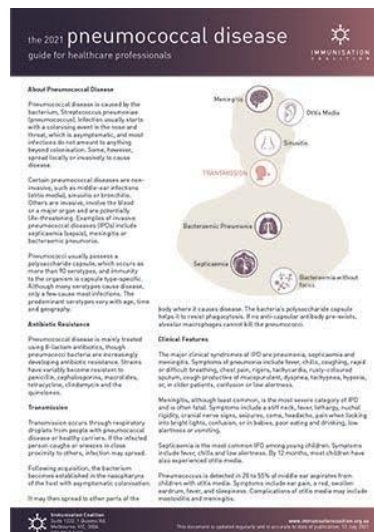

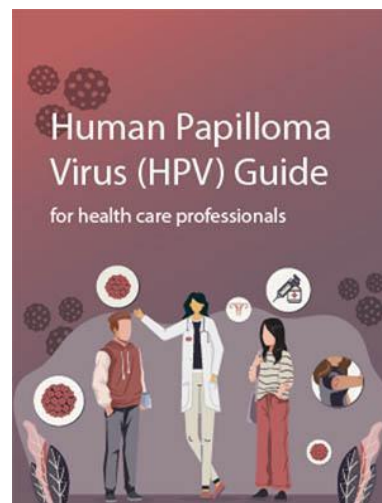

Social Values Report

Social return on investment is a principles-based method for measuring extra-financial value. It measures values that are not traditionally reflected in financial statements and is used to evaluate the impact on stakeholders.

The Immunisation Coalition analysed its activities in 2019 to produce a comprehensive valuation of its social impact on the community. The results showed that an investment of \$500,000 returned \$28,000,000 worth of value to the community.

Pandemic Preparedness in Aged Care Facilities





The IC increased its video production in 2021, commencing the year with a video about Aged Care Pandemic Planning and Preparedness. The concept grew out of a study by Prof Robert Booy which was looking at the impact of rapid response to influenza outbreaks in residential aged care facilities. The study demonstrated that outbreaks were less frequent and less severe when the program was implemented. As the video shows, the concept can be applied to Covid or any other infectious diseases outbreak in residential facilities.

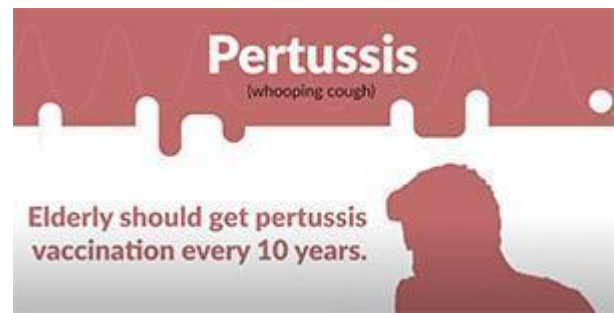

Episode one: Administration of COVID-19 vaccines (15 March 2021)

Welcome to the first episode of Vax Chat Australia, a podcast hosted by the Immunisation Coalition to provide information for GPs and other vaccine providers addressing critical issues about administration of COVID-19 vaccines during the coming months. Many of us on the frontline are facing a myriad of questions from patients. Vax Chat Australia will provide information and sources to answer these questions about the various and changing COVID-19 vaccines.

Episode two: COVID-19 Vaccines- Patient questions (29 March 2021)

Many GPs are now able to give the AstraZeneca Vaccine to their patients (and others) who meet the 1b criteria and both those who have and have not yet started are facing a deluge of questions and calls about it. Vax Chat Australia will provide information and sources to answer both your and your patient's current questions about the COVID-19 vaccines. We still have only the two vaccines available in Australia, the AZ and Pfizer and there is a lot of talk about the various side effects and efficacy of the two but the big news story in the last weeks is the halt of the AstraZeneca vaccine while there is an investigation into reported incidence of blood clots.

Episode three: Vaccine rollout with Dr Paul Griffin (12 April 2021)

Dr Paul Griffin, an Infectious Diseases Physician and Microbiologist, Mater Director of Infectious Diseases Associate Professor discussed the vaccine roll out with hosts Susan Pearce and GP Dr Rod Pearce. More and more General Practitioners will have commenced their COVID vaccination roll out and states are preparing to open local mass vaccination clinics to support the existing commonwealth vaccination clinics. At the time of recording, more than 800,000 people in Australia have been vaccinated and daily numbers are increasing.

Episode four: Vaccines eligibility with Dr Caroline Foreman (26 April 2021)

Dr Caroline Foreman, a clinical immunologist, and Chief Doctor at the Australian Medic Alert Foundation, discussed the vaccination roll out with hosts Susan Pearce and GP Dr Rod Pearce. As always seems to be the case with COVID it has been a rollercoaster few weeks! Our entire vaccination rollout has been rethought with all those over 50 being eligible to receive the AZ vaccine from May 3rd and at GPs from May 17th.

Episode five: India's Covid-19 crisis with Professor Ian Barr (10 May 2021)

Professor Ian Barr joins Suzie P and Dr Rodney Pearce to discuss India's exploding COVID-19 rate and the ban Australia has put on flights from India due to the dramatic rise in international travellers with COVID-19.

Episode six: Prevention and new hope with Professor Mary-Louise McLaws (24 May 2021)

Professor Mary-Louise McLaws is an epidemiologist with expertise in hospital infection and infectious diseases control. Her COVID-19 related activities include: member of the World Health Organization (WHO) Health Emergencies Program Experts Advisory Panel for Infection Prevention and Control Preparedness, Readiness and Response to COVID-19 and member of the NSW Clinical Excellence Commission COVID Infection Prevention and Control taskforce. She is the Focal Point for the WHO Global Outbreak Alert and Response Network (GOARN) in the School of Population Health.

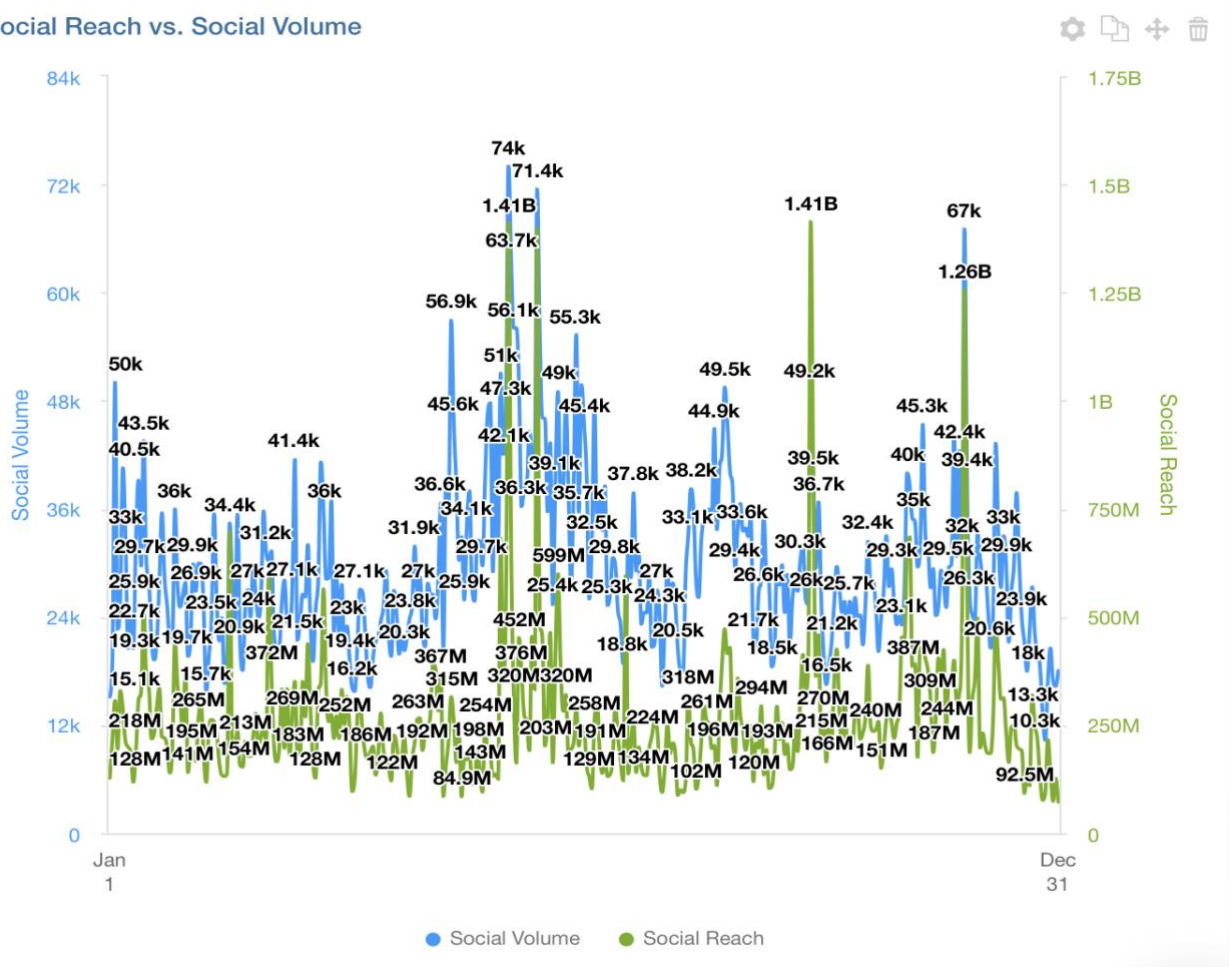

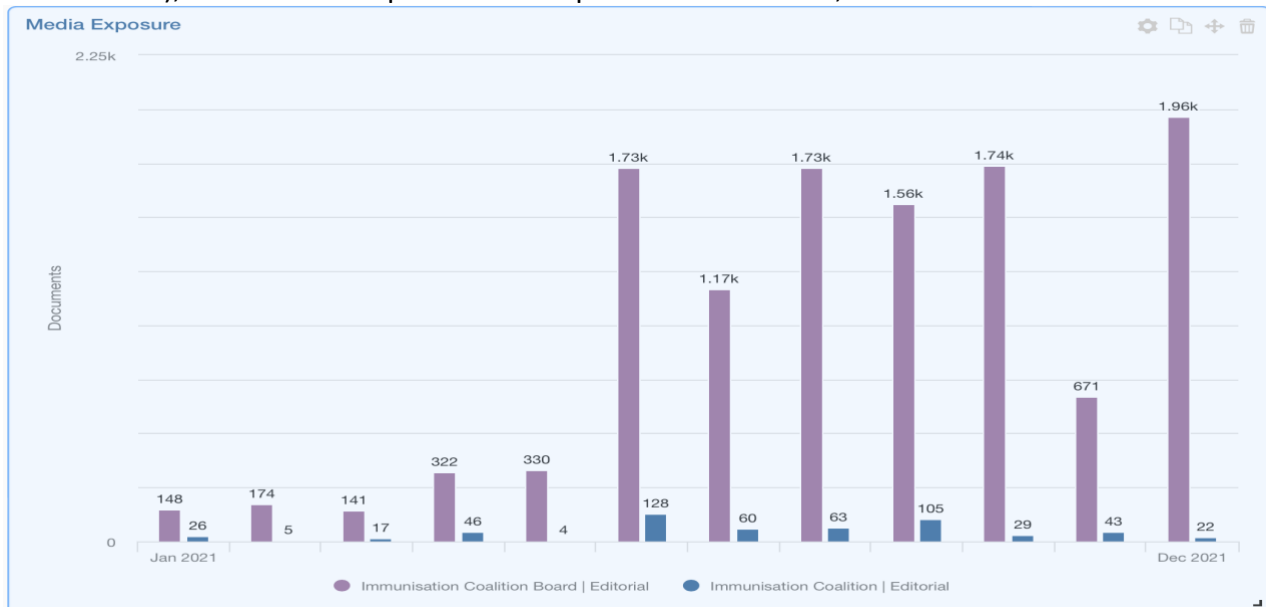

Experts urge Australians: If you are not in the queue for a COVID vaccine - get your influenza vaccination now.

Calls for COVID and flu vaccinations to be administered on the same day

- The COVID lockdown in Victoria has brought the pace of the vaccine rollout to attention, particularly in aged care.

Lack of access to COVID-19 vaccine threatening global immunity - urgent plea to unite developing nations through vaccinations

The Immunisation Coalition is issuing an urgent plea to Australians to help close the global COVID-19 vaccination gap by donating to UNICEF Australia in a bid to improve access in lower income countries.

To date, the COVID-19 pandemic has devastatingly led to the death of approximately 3.9 million people globally.¹ Many of those living in high income countries can now access free COVID-19 vaccinations, with many lower income countries yet to receive a single dose.

Experts, Grand Mufti press conference on COVID-19 to get the message to Muslims across Australia

Acting as moderator of this afternoon's press conference will be University of Sydney Honorary Professor Robert Booy.

"We must get clear appropriate messages conveyed to local communities through their local leaders, be they religious, community, ethnic, or sports leaders," said Professor Booy, co-lead of the Mass-Gathering Medicine node of the Marie Bashir Institute, which is being re-named Sydney Infectious Diseases.

The University of Sydney and the Immunisation Coalition have developed a series of short explanatory videos to help GPs and pharmacists better explain covid disease and its prevention by vaccination.

Media Release 15 September 2021

Australian medical experts call for all eligible members of the public to be given the choice of Covid-19 vaccine to ensure maximum possible uptake.

Prof Robert Booy, Director of the Immunisation Coalition said: "Covid 19 is a clear and present danger in Australia and there is an urgent need to optimize vaccination uptake".

"The Immunisation Coalition is calling for members of the public to get vaccinated as soon as possible and suggesting to the government that all eligible people be given the choice of vaccination, given that the supplies of mRNA vaccines have markedly increased" says Dr Rod Pearce, Chairman of the Immunisation Coalition.

Prof Robert Booy went on to say: "The 70% double vaccination rate can be reached within a few weeks and 80% uptake could follow within a further 2 weeks. However, protection of the public will be even greater, and better if we continue to promote vaccine uptake as high as possible, for example 90%.

The equity in having a choice for all, whether aged above or below 60, and the large improvement in vaccine supply, can together lead to both far better vaccine uptake and public protection. We may have to live with Covid-19, but its impact can be greatly mitigated with higher vaccine uptake".

COVID-19 RISKS EXPLAINED WITH NEW TOOL

A calculator to help people understand their risk factors for COVID-19 infection and vaccination has been launched by the Immunisation Coalition in collaboration with Australian researchers.

The tool's three co-lead researchers are University of Queensland virologist Dr Kirsty Short, CoRiCal instigator from Flinders University Associate Professor John Litt and GP Dr Andrew Baird.

Dr Kirsty Short said the Immunisation Coalition COVID-19 Risk Calculator (CoRiCal) was an

online tool to support GPs and community members in their discussions about the benefits and risks of COVID-19 vaccines.

"This tool is really designed to help people make an informed decision around vaccination based on their current circumstances and also see their risk for getting COVID-19 under different transmission scenarios," Dr Short said.

"Users can access the tool and input their age, sex, community transmission and vaccination status to find out their personalised risk calculation.

"For example, you can find out your chance of being infected with COVID-19 versus your chance of dying from the disease.

"You can also find out your chance of developing an atypical blood clot from the AstraZeneca vaccine and see this data in the context of other relatable risks – like getting struck by lightning or winning OzLotto."

The CoRiCal Covid Risk Calculator is in its pilot stage but will be continuously updated in line with the latest health and scientific advice, including risk assessments on Pfizer and Moderna vaccines, pre-existing medical conditions such as obesity and diabetes, and long COVID.

The CoRiCal project included a team of GPs, medical scientists, public health physicians, epidemiologists and statisticians.

Associate Professor John Litt, Immunisation Coalition Scientific Advisory Committee member, said he hoped that CoRiCal would help GPs save time and create an accurate assessment of an individual's risk of COVID-19 or one of the vaccines.

"GPs are spending a lot of time trying to explain the risks of COVID-19 and the various vaccines to their patients," Dr Litt said.

"An accurate, evidence-based tool that is transparent and unaligned with professional groups should help GPs in their task of facilitating COVID vaccination for their patients."

Melbourne-based GP Dr Andrew Baird said CoRiCal was adaptable for booster doses, new viral strains, new vaccines, younger age groups, international markets and even for other infectious diseases.

"It presents risk using simple bar-charts, so that it's easy to compare the risks for different outcomes related to COVID-19 and vaccines," Dr Baird said.

"CoRiCal may help Australia to move towards 90 percent, 95 per cent, or even more of the 16 and over population being fully vaccinated.

"The higher the rate of vaccination in the population, the better it will be for individuals, communities, mental health, health services, and the country."

The Immunisation Coalition is urging healthcare providers, including GPs, pharmacists and relevant clinics, to carefully consider and place their orders for influenza vaccination before November 19, 2021.

As lockdowns ease and borders re-open, a rebound season of influenza is highly probable. But with orders from vaccine providers low, experts warn Australia will experience issues with supply not meeting demand when it comes to influenza vaccination in 2022.

Early indications from Southeast Asia, Europe and the United Kingdom signal a resurgence of influenza in Australia, and around the globe, regardless of low case numbers this year.

"We need to be clear, 2021 has not been reflective of a typical influenza season.

All the measures associated with slowing the transmission of COVID-19, resulted in an abnormal influenza season," said Prof Robert Booy, Chair of the Immunisation Coalition's Scientific Advisory Committee.

Chairman of the Immunisation Coalition, Dr Rod Pearce added “What is important now, is that we avoid a vaccine shortage next year because providers have reduced their vaccine orders for 2022, based on reduced cases and vaccine uptake this year.”

Experts also warn that it is hard to rectify a low or out of stock situation once the season commences, inadvertently putting pressure on the healthcare system whilst additional stock is secured.

“We know that preorders for 2022 are significantly lower than this time last year. We cannot simply turn the manufacturing process on and off for influenza vaccination.

It is important our providers are prepared, by ensuring sufficient supply levels are reached ahead of the season,” said Dr Pearce.

National president of the Pharmacy Guild Trent Twomey said “Community pharmacies are particularly well placed to offer the flu vaccination to patients and this service has proven to be hugely successful and popular with communities across the country and we are encouraging Guild members to pre-order so they are prepared for the 2022 season.”

Whilst focus continues to surround the risk of COVID-19, the Immunisation Coalition wants to remind providers and consumers that influenza can be severe, resulting in hospitalisation and even death, especially for at-risk populations.

“Co-administration of influenza vaccine and COVID-19 boosters is now recommended by ATAGI. This will create greater demand for influenza vaccines and we need to be prepared for it. Securing steady supply of influenza vaccination is our greatest weapon against this virus returning in 2022,” added Dr Rod Pearce.

The Immunisation Coalition and industry stakeholders are committed to reminding Australians of the risk of contracting influenza and to encourage vaccination of consumers in a timely and appropriate manner.

“The time for vaccination is before the outbreak commences, and we intend to coordinate a media awareness campaign for consumers, once we’re confident that supply levels have been reached for the season ahead,” said Dr Pearce.
